# Silicon PIN Photodiode

### Description

BPW83 is a high speed and high sensitive PIN photodiode in a flat side view plastic package. The epoxy package itself is an IR filter, spectrally matched to GaAs or GaAlAs IR emitters ( $\lambda_p \ge 800$  nm). The large active area combined with a flat case gives

a high sensitivity at a wide viewing angle.

#### **Features**

- Large radiant sensitive area (A=7.5 mm<sup>2</sup>)
- Wide angle of half sensitivity  $\varphi = \pm 65^{\circ}$
- High radiant sensitivity
- Fast response times
- Small junction capacitance
- Plastic case with IR filter




Figure 1. Reverse Dark Current vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 2. Relative Reverse Light Current vs. Ambient Temperature



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


Figure 3. Reverse Light Current vs. Irradiance




Figure 4. Reverse Light Current vs. Reverse Voltage




Figure 5. Diode Capacitance vs. Reverse Voltage




Figure 6. Relative Spectral Sensitivity vs. Wavelength





Figure 7. Relative Radiant Sensitivity vs. Angular Displacement



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### **Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement**

It is the policy of Vishay Semiconductor GmbH to

- 1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.

- 3. Council Decision 88/540/EEC and 91/690/EEC Annex A, B and C (transitional substances) respectively.
