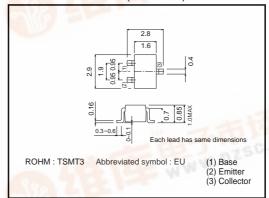

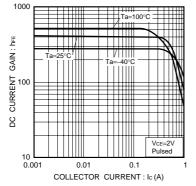


Fig.1 DC current gain vs. collector current

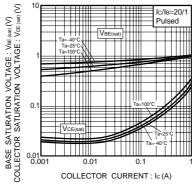


Fig.2 Collector-emitter saturation voltage base-emitter saturation voltage vs. collector current

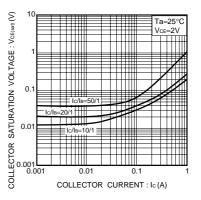


Fig.3 Collector-emitter saturation voltage vs. collector current

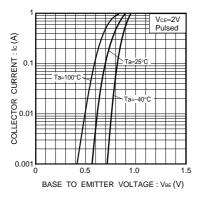


Fig.4 Grounded emitter propagation characteristics

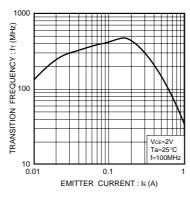


Fig.5 Gain bandwidth product vs. emitter current

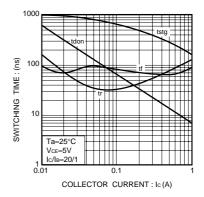


Fig.6 Switching time

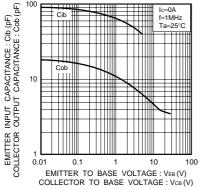


Fig.7 Collector output capacitance vs. collector-base voltage Emitter input capacitance vs. emitter-base voltage

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
