## Low Noise, Low Power I<sup>2</sup>C<sup>®</sup> Bus, 256 Taps

The ISL90840 integrates four digitally controlled potentiometers (XDCP) on a monolithic CMOS integrated circuit.

The digitally controlled potentiometers are implemented with a combination of resistor elements and CMOS switches. The position of the wipers are controlled by the user through the I<sup>2</sup>C bus interface. Each potentiometer has an associated Wiper Register (WR) that can be directly written to and read by the user. The contents of the WR controls the position of the wiper.

The DCPs can be used as three-terminal potentiometers or as two-terminal variable resistors in a wide variety of applications including control, parameter adjustments, and signal processing.



#### ISL90840 (20 LEAD TSSOP) TOP VIEW




## **Functional Diagram**



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




FIGURE 1. WIPER RESISTANCE vs TAP POSITION  $[I(RW) = V_{CC} / R_{TOTAL}] \ FOR \ 50 k\Omega \ (U)$ 




FIGURE 2. STANDBY I<sub>CC</sub> vs V<sub>CC</sub>




FIGURE 3. DNL vs TAP POSITION IN VOLTAGE DIVIDER MODE FOR 10k $\Omega$  (W)




FIGURE 5. ZSerror vs TEMPERATURE FOR  $50k\Omega$  (W)




FIGURE 7. DNL vs TAP POSITION IN RHEOSTAT MODE FOR  $50k\Omega$  (U)




FIGURE 4. INL vs TAP POSITION IN VOLTAGE DIVIDER MODE FOR 10k $\Omega$  (W)




FIGURE 6. FSerror vs TEMPERATURE FOR 50k $\Omega$  (W)




FIGURE 8. INL vs TAP POSITION IN RHEOSTAT MODE FOR  $50 k\Omega$  (U)




FIGURE 9. END TO END  $R_{\mbox{TOTAL}}$  % CHANGE vs TEMPERATURE FOR 50k $\Omega$  (W)




FIGURE 11. TC FOR RHEOSTAT MODE IN ppm FOR 50k $\Omega$  (W)




FIGURE 13. MIDSCALE GLITCH, CODE 80h TO 7Fh (WIPER 0)




FIGURE 10. TC FOR VOLTAGE DIVIDER MODE IN ppm FOR 50k $\Omega$  (W)




FIGURE 12. FREQUENCY RESPONSE (2.2MHz)




FIGURE 14. LARGE SIGNAL SETTLING TIME

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### **Principles of Operation**

The ISL90840 is an integrated circuit incorporating four DCPs with their associated registers, and an I<sup>2</sup>C serial interface providing direct communication between a host and the potentiometers.

#### **DCP Description**

Each DCP is implemented with a combination of resistor elements and CMOS switches. The physical ends of each DCP are equivalent to the fixed terminals of a mechanical potentiometer (R<sub>H</sub> and R<sub>I</sub> pins). The R<sub>W</sub> pin of each DCP is connected to intermediate nodes, and is equivalent to the wiper terminal of a mechanical potentiometer. The position of the wiper terminal within the DCP is controlled by an 8-bit volatile Wiper Register (WR). Each DCP has its own WR. When the WR of a DCP contains all zeroes (WR<7:0>: 00h), its wiper terminal (R<sub>W</sub>) is closest to its "Low" terminal (R<sub>I</sub>). When the WR of a DCP contains all ones (WR<7:0>: FFh), its wiper terminal (R<sub>W</sub>) is closest to its "High" terminal (R<sub>H</sub>). As the value of the WR increases from all zeroes (00h) to all ones (255 decimal), the wiper moves monotonically from the position closest to  $R_L$  to the closest to  $R_H$ . At the same time, the resistance between R<sub>W</sub> and R<sub>I</sub> increases monotonically, while the resistance between R<sub>H</sub> and R<sub>W</sub> decreases monotonically.

While the ISL90840 is being powered up, all four WRs are reset to 80h (128 decimal), which locates  $R_W$  roughly at the center between  $R_L$  and  $R_H$ .

The WRs can be read or written to directly using the  $I^2C$  serial interface as described in the following sections. The  $I^2C$  interface Address Byte has to be set to 00h, 01h, 02h, and 03h to access the WR of DCP0, DCP1, DCP2, and DCP3 respectively

## I<sup>2</sup>C Serial Interface

The ISL90840 supports a bidirectional bus oriented protocol. The protocol defines any device that sends data onto the bus as a transmitter and the receiving device as the receiver. The device controlling the transfer is a master and the device being controlled is the slave. The master always initiates data transfers and provides the clock for both transmit and receive operations. Therefore, the ISL90840 operates as a slave device in all applications.

All communication over the  $I^2C$  interface is conducted by sending the MSB of each byte of data first.

#### **Protocol Conventions**

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


FIGURE 15. VALID DATA CHANGES, START, AND STOP CONDITIONS

Data states on the SDA line must change only during SCL LOW periods. SDA state changes during SCL HIGH are reserved for indicating START and STOP conditions (See Figure 15). On power-up of the ISL90840 the SDA pin is in the input mode.

All I<sup>2</sup>C interface operations must begin with a START condition, which is a HIGH to LOW transition of SDA while SCL is HIGH. The ISL90840 continuously monitors the SDA and SCL lines for the START condition and does not respond to any command until this condition is met (See Figure 15). A START condition is ignored during the power-up of the device.

All I<sup>2</sup>C interface operations must be terminated by a STOP condition, which is a LOW to HIGH transition of SDA while SCL is HIGH (See Figure 15). A STOP condition at the end of a read operation, or at the end of a write operation places the device in its standby mode.






FIGURE 16. ACKNOWLEDGE RESPONSE FROM RECEIVER

An ACK, Acknowledge, is a software convention used to indicate a successful data transfer. The transmitting device, either master or slave, releases the SDA bus after transmitting eight bits. During the ninth clock cycle, the receiver pulls the SDA line LOW to acknowledge the reception of the eight bits of data (See Figure 16).

The ISL90840 responds with an ACK after recognition of a START condition followed by a valid Identification Byte, and once again after successful receipt of an Address Byte. The ISL90840 also responds with an ACK after receiving a Data Byte of a write operation. The master must respond with an ACK after receiving a Data Byte of a read operation

A valid Identification Byte contains 0101 as the four MSBs, and the following three bits matching the logic values present at pins A2, A1, and A0. The LSB is the Read/Write bit. Its value is "1" for a Read operation, and "0" for a Write operation (See Table 1).

Logic values at pins A2, A1, and A0 respectively




FIGURE 17. BYTE WRITE SEQUENCE




FIGURE 18. READ SEQUENCE

### Write Operation

A Write operation requires a START condition, followed by a valid Identification Byte, a valid Address Byte, a Data Byte, and a STOP condition. After each of the three bytes, the ISL90840 responds with an ACK. At this time, the device enters its standby state (See Figure 17).


### **Read Operation**

A Read operation consist of a three byte instruction followed by one or more Data Bytes (See Figure 18). The master initiates the operation issuing the following sequence: a START, the Identification byte with the R/ $\overline{W}$  bit set to "0", an Address Byte, a second START, and a second Identification byte with the R/ $\overline{W}$  bit set to "1". After each of the three bytes, the ISL90840 responds with an ACK. Then the ISL90840 transmits Data Bytes as long as the master responds with an ACK during the SCL cycle following the eighth bit of each byte. The master terminates the read operation (issuing a STOP condition) following the last bit of the last Data Byte (See Figure 18).


The Data Bytes are from the registers indicated by an internal pointer. This pointer initial value is determined by the Address Byte in the Read operation instruction, and increments by one during transmission of each Data Byte. After reaching the memory location 03h, the pointer "rolls over" to 00h, and the device continues to output data for each ACK received.


